CAMP PHILBROOK: KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

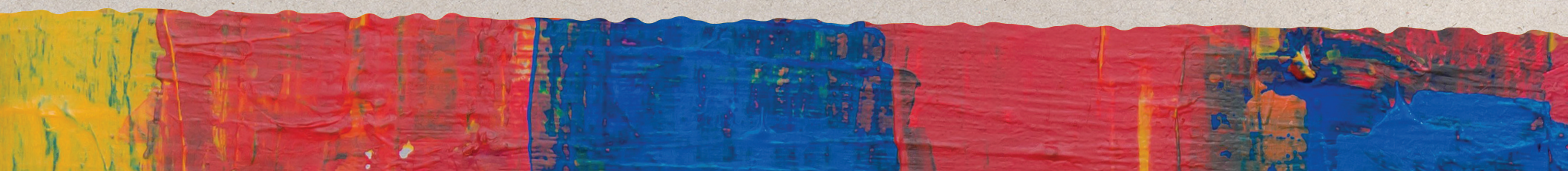
To help you prepare for your Camp Philbrook experience, we have assembled a guide with what you need to know before you arrive on your first day of camp. Additional information regarding drop-off, pick-up, and other information will be emailed to all camp families one week prior to their enrolled camp session(s).

REGISTRATION & TICKETING

- All ticket sales are final and non-refundable. We may be able to exchange your ticket for another camp of comparable price. Please contact the Nature Education Coordinator at (918)748-5373 or at twillis@philbrook.org. (Please note that we are unable to prorate camp fees on a daily basis.)
- Each camper must have a complete registration form as part of the registration process. Please email Toni Willis at twillis@philbrook.org or call (918)748-5373 if any information changes or needs to be updated before you arrive.
- Once registered, you'll receive an email from Philbrook confirming your online registration. A follow-up email with important reminders and arrival information will be sent about one week before each camp session to all registrants.
- When you register, please list all allergies or disability-related accommodations for your camper in your registration form. Please be aware that we cannot guarantee a 100% nut-free zone. Once registered, please contact twillis@philbrook.org if you would like to further discuss your child's allergies or accommodation requests.

MAINTAINING A SAFE AND HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT

- Studios will be disinfected between AM & PM sessions.
- Campers will not be allowed to attend if they are ill. Children who become ill during the camp day will be removed from the studio and isolated. Parents/caregivers will be contacted to pick up their child from camp.
- All camp workshops will spend ample time outdoors as weather allows for snack time, artmaking time, and exploring out in the gardens.
- Camp staff monitor weather each day for ozone alerts, extreme heat, and other inclement weather. When the weather is unsafe for prolonged outdoor activity, campers will remain indoors or keep their outside time brief. Camp staff will ensure all campers take breaks and stay hydrated.
- Lunchtime will be held outdoors in our beautiful gardens. In case of inclement or extreme temperature, campers will eat indoors.
- Camp Philbrook is a peanut-free camp. Please do not send your child to camp with peanut products.
- All caregivers will be required to show their photo identification at pick up each day.

WHAT TO EXPECT AT CAMP PHILBROOK

- Campers will spend time indoors in the galleries and studios and outdoors in our gardens. Campers will experiment and create with a wide range of art materials to express their artistic style while meeting new friends along the way.
- Many camps occur outside. Please arrive at camp prepared for adventure, wearing closed-toe shoes, sunscreen, bug spray (if desired), and dressing for the weather.
- Morning camp sessions last from 9 a.m.–12 p.m. and afternoon sessions last from 1 p.m.–4 p.m.
- We have a max capacity of 17 campers per camp for ages 7–14. Camps for ages 5 & 6 are capped at 15.
- Camps take place under the care of skilled camp instructors and knowledgeable program assistants both trained in camp protocols. Each camp includes guided time in the galleries as well as hands on artmaking in the studio.
- A small snack (Goldfish or pretzels) will be provided during the morning and afternoon classes. However, please send a non-perishable snack with your child if you wish to bring your own.

WHAT TO SEND WITH YOUR CAMPER

- Have your camper wear comfortable, breathable clothes that they can get messy in. Smocks or aprons are provided but do not cover their entire outfit. Keep in mind that campers will be working with both washable and permanent materials.
- We will go outdoors each day, so please apply sunscreen and bug spray before arriving, and be sure your camper is wearing appropriate shoes for outdoor walking. (Please note no aerosol sprays)
- Please send a water bottle labeled with your camper's name each day. Each studio will be equipped with a station to refill their bottles throughout the day.
- Campers enrolled in a full day of camp will eat lunch from noon–1 p.m. All full day campers should bring a sack lunch that is clearly labeled with their name. Camp Philbrook is a peanut-free camp. Please note that we are unable to provide access to a refrigerator or microwave. Please call Toni Willis at (918) 748-5373 with any questions or concerns.

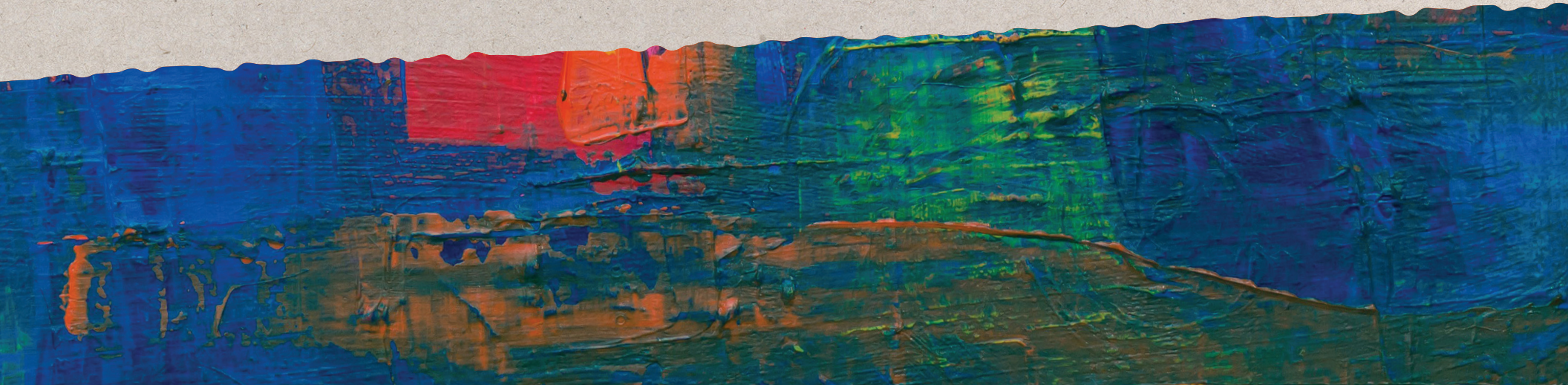
REMINDERS AND GUIDELINES

- All personal items such as water bottles, clothing and lunches should be labeled with the student's first and last name. No toys or games are permitted. We ask that students refrain from using cell phones during camp hours.
- To ensure an optimal experience for all, please note that your child(ren) must have experience in a classroom setting prior to the start of camps, must be potty-trained, AND must be the appropriate age for the camps they are registered for. Campers who are too young for the camp they are signed up for may be asked not to return until they are old enough to participate.
- If you have questions or concerns regarding your child's age and the camp they are signed up for, please do not hesitate to reach out via email.
- Campers must be able to independently use the toilet. The child must consistently use the toilet independently, including being able to recognize the need to go, communicate their needs, pull their pants up and down, and go to the bathroom without significant accident, essentially managing their toileting needs without relying on diapers or pull ups.
- Please note that this is a drop-off camp. Our camps promote independent learning and socialization opportunities for your child. If you feel your child is unable to remain in camp without you, it may be best to wait a year before you send them to camp. Parents/guardians are welcome to enjoy our museum facilities when we are open, but when the museum is closed to the public, we cannot accommodate additional visitors within the museum.

EXPECTATIONS

- 1.** We expect all campers and staff to always act respectfully when they are at camp and to behave in a kind, responsible way.
- 2.** Campers should:
 - a.)** Arrive at camp ready to listen, participate, and have fun.
 - b.)** Take responsibility for their actions.
 - c.)** Respect themselves, other campers, their teachers, camp equipment, and their environment.
 - d.)** Understand that honesty will be the basis for all relationships and interactions.
- 3.** Campers are encouraged to talk to any camp staff member if they are uncomfortable with any experiences or need assistance while at camp.
- 4.** If a camper is unable to follow these guidelines, staff will work closely with the camper and their caregiver/s to resolve the situation. As a last resort, if the camp environment is deemed not to be a good fit, a camper may be asked to withdraw. Camp Philbrook is unable to issue partial or full refunds.
